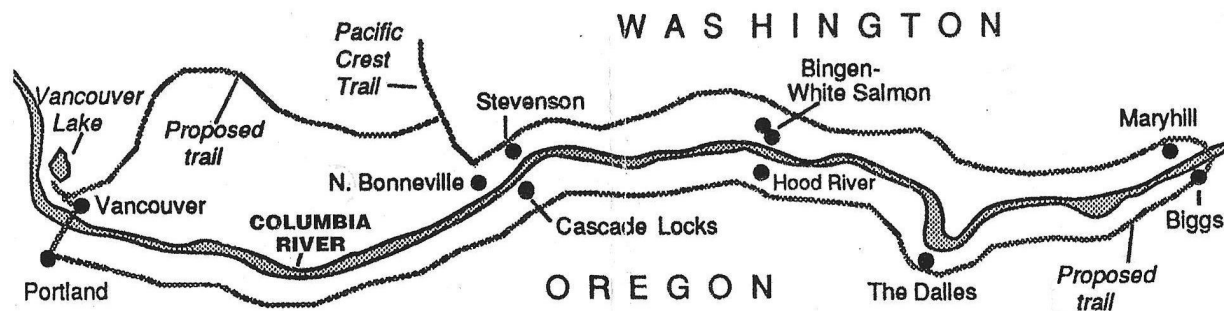

Proposed Chinook Trail



Standing on the summit of Silver Star Mountain ...

... in 1986, two lifelong hiking companions, Don Cannard and Ed Robertson, dreamed of a recreational trail along the Washington rim of the newly formed Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area. Two years later, the idea developed into a proposed 300 mile rim-top loop through Washington and Oregon. Don and Ed spent nights and days sharing their idea with the public agencies throughout the Gorge, and in 1988 CTA was incorporated in both states. Since then, support for the Chinook Trail has brought together many people from the public and private sectors who share an ongoing spirit of conservation to preserve the natural beauty of the Columbia River Gorge.

CTA Accomplishments

Although the Chinook Trail is still a work in progress, we have already had several long distance hikers make the loop from Vancouver to Portland via the bridge crossing at Maryhill, Washington and Biggs Junction, Oregon.

Currently the trail includes the Discovery Trail and the Ellen Davis Trail in Vancouver. The longest continuous section begins at Moulton Falls County Park and continues over the Bells Mountain Trail and onto the Tarbell Trail. The Kloochman Butte Trail, Ed's Trail, and the Bluff Mountain Trail take the hiker to FR 41, FR 41 links to the Pacific Crest Trail and the Grassy Knoll Trail, ending at the Grassy Knoll Trailhead. Trails in Oregon include The Dalles Riverfront Trail and the Mosier Twin Tunnels Trail east of Hood River. Other existing roads and trails make the 300 mile trek a hiker's delight.

Volunteers Make It Happen

Volunteers power the work of the CTA in many ways. The **Board of Directors** dreams and implements the vision for the Chinook Trail and is always looking for more members. **Agency planning meetings** are an important step in the development and stewardship of new and existing trails. **Clerical tasks and community contacts** attract still more volunteers, and periodic **trail work parties** provide us with many opportunities for service..
