The Dalles Waterfront Trail

In 1989, community groups, state and federal agencies, and individual citizens met for eleven months to develop a plan for The Dalles waterfront. The plan encompasses the area between The Dalles Dam and the proposed USFS Discovery Center above Taylor Lakes, a distance of about seven miles. The Dalles Riverfront Plan includes a waterfront trail connecting these two points. Chinook Trail Board members Don Cannard, Ed Robertson, and Boyd Jacobsen served on this community planning group.


The Dalles Riverfront Plan has

been instrumental in securing community support and funding from a variety of sources. Boyd Jacobsen reports that a trail segment in the Taylor Lakes area has been paved. An access bridge to this area has also been completed. The trail segment to the Discovery Center will be completed in 1994, when federal funds for a rail-road underpass are made available.

The Dalles Riverfront Trail is an important feature of the Chinook Trail. It will connect The Dalles with the proposed Chinook Trail to the east and west.

Dalles Mountain Ranch - Columbia Hills

The Washington State Parks and Washington Department of Natural Resources have accepted title to the 6500 acre Dalles Mountain Ranch in Klickitat County. The Trust for public lands signed the initial option for the purchase. Funds for the acquisition come from the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Coalition funded by the Washington Legislature through the Washington Inter-Agency for Outdoor Recreation. The upper portion of the ranch will be managed through WDNR's Natural Heritage Program, due to the presence of several special plants. The lower portion will be managed by WSP, which will be developing interim management guidelines. WSP notes potential for environmental studies as well as a meeting site at the ranch house. Some of the older buildings may become available for public use. WSP envisions developing use guidelines to promote a variety of passive recreation activities for the site.

The Chinook Trail Association has been involved in this project since 1989. A portion of the Chinook Trail will travel through this beautiful site. The spectacular views to the north and south take in the Columbia Plateau dryland areas, as well as many of the major peaks of the Cascades of Washington and Oregon. The acquisition of the rail banked Klickitat railroad and the Dalles Mountain Ranch enhances the possibility of a unique trail system in the Columbia River Gorge.



Klickitat Railroad, Rails to Trails

On January 28, 1994 in Spokane, the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission voted to accept title to the 30 plus miles of the rail-banked Burlington Northern Klickitat Railroad which connects Lyle and Goldendale. The Rails to Trails Conservancy held title until final arrangements for title transfer could be arranged. The United States Forest Service will manage the proposed trail and the WSP will hold title. The USFS accepted responsibility to develop interim and final management guidelines, conduct the environmental assessment, and oversee final clean-up. A salvage contractor is removing all rails and ties and Burlington Northern will be responsible for clean-up of any toxic sites. Art Carroll, manager of the USFS – Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area outlined the necessary steps in the development of the management guidelines.

Don Cannard testified in support of the Commission's action. The Chinook Trail will travel on a portion of the proposed 'rails to trails' trail. The WSP Commission is to be commended for accepting title for the benefit of the Citizens of the State of Washington, and the USFS for accepting management of the 30 plus mile conversion. The USFS is prohibited by law from holding title to rail-banked conversions, but they can manage trails on those lands.

This parkway travels alongside the scenic Klickitat River for over 10 miles and then along Swale Canyon on its way to Goldendale. This will provide an unparalleled opportunity to view wildlife and vegetation of the oak grassland in the eastern portion of the Columbia River Gorge. A linkage to the Dalles Mountain Ranch becomes possible with this acquisition.

Master Plan for Gorge State Parks

The Draft Master Plan for the Columbia Gorge District State Parks was adopted by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department Commission at its meeting in January, 1994. An important aspect of the plan was the inclusion of a comprehensive set of trail maps and proposals for the south side of the Gorge. The goal is to get all the existing and proposed trails shown in relationship to OPRD properties and the other trails in the system. Key parts of the Chinook Trail proposal cross OPRD lands in the west end of the Gorge. The Chinook Trail alignment farther to the east is mostly on USDA FS lands.

To complete a "continuous mid-level trail through the gorge" is a goal of the Detailed Draft Master Plan. The proposed Chinook Trail alignment in the west part of the Gorge will provide for some of the recreation needs identified in the plan analysis, which includes more day-use hiking opportunities and trails which have gentler grades.

Trail goals and proposals on OPRD lands will require close and active partnerships with trail users, other agencies, and jurisdictions.
